

School Procedures



Attendance

Signing out

Teaching & Learning at Holy Trinity Nursery



At Holy Trinity, the Nursery Curriculum encompasses six key areas:

Through regular and careful observation of the children at play, we will be able to assess how they are coping and achieving in all areas of the curriculum. Keeping thorough records of your child's progress, enables us to tailor activities to meet their individual needs and to keep you informed of their progress.

- Parkanaur








In order to provide the best quality education to our pupils, we strive to ensure that:



Pastoral Care



At Holy Trinity Primary School, the pastoral care of your child in our number one priority. We want your child to feel safe and secure so that they can make maximum benefit of the many educational opportunities on offer in our school and realise their full learning potential academically, personally, emotionally and socially.

We encourage our pupils to lead healthy, resilient and well balanced lives. We help them to develop the skills to make informed choices and decisions which will enable them to become confident, independent and responsible citizens through social, pastoral and self protection programmes like 'Bee Safe', 'Internet Safety' etc.



Every opportunity is taken in Holy Trinity Primary School to celebrate the children's achievements. These successes are recognised through the presentation of certificates in assemblies, through showcasing our achievements weekly on 'Trinity Talents' and through photos and articles on School Dojo or our school website www.holytrinitypscookstown.org or our monthly 'Trinity News'.

Catholic Ethos

The Catholic Ethos of the school is very much in evidence and is celebrated throughout the school year. Each year, we organise or participate in a series of activities around Catholic Schools' Week. Sacramental occasions such as First Holy Communion and Confirmation are important events in our school's liturgical calendar.

Notwithstanding the strong Catholic ethos, the school is welcoming to all children and parents of other faiths or none. We also value our links with other schools and denominations within the wider community through involvement in projects and programmes such as Shared Education.

Positive Behaviour

We expect and encourage high standards of behaviour throughout our school. We aim to inspire our children to behave responsibly, cooperatively and with consideration and care for others and support them in learning how to work and play well together. There is an emphasis on praise, reward and the development of good relationships in which effective learning can take place.

Partnership with Parents

In Holy Trinity Primary School, parents are considered as partners in the provision of education and most especially in the area of pastoral care. We adopt an open door policy in relation to pastoral issues raised by parents. Meetings or calls with your child's class teacher / Principal to discuss concerns can be arranged within twenty four hours.

Anti-Bullying

We take a pro-active approach to anti-bullying in our school. We explore the effects of our behaviour on others regularly with our children through classroom activities, assemblies and whole-school awareness initiatives — Anti-Bullying Week, Random Acts of Kindness Day, etc. All reported incidents of bullying are taken seriously and dealt with in accordance to the procedures outlined in our Anti-Bullying Policy.



Child Protection & Safeguarding

In Holy Trinity, the welfare and protection of children is of critical importance. We aim to ensure that every pupil in our school feels valued, safe and happy.

Our school, is a caring, secure and supportive environment, valuing individuals for their unique talents and abilities. We are available to discuss any pastoral issues, big or small, and to help parents and their children in any way we can.

Our Child Protection and Safeguarding Policies have clear guidance on procedures to follow when there are concerns about the welfare and protection of any child. Details regarding our school's safeguarding procedures (which are fully compliant with all Department of Education Guidelines in this area*) are regularly communicated to parents and are translated into various languages. Copies of all policies are available on the school website.

The School Safeguarding Team meet twice each half term to oversee and evaluate provision in this area. Liaison with outside agencies is excellent.

Events such as Internet Safety/NSPCC talks etc are organised for the pupils throughout the school year.

An Inclusive School



As a Catholic school, we welcome everyone and are inclusive irrespective of race, class, colour, creed, ability or gender. We pride ourselves as being a culturally diverse and inclusive community where we strive to meet the needs of each and every child.







SEN Provision

Provision for children with special needs is given a high priority within Holy Trinity Primary School. Children with learning difficulties are identified at the earliest possible opportunity and provision made.

Close contact is maintained with parents to plan and evaluate the child's progress. Our school special needs coordinator (SENCO) leads a team of professional staff including teachers and classroom assistants in planning the delivery of the special needs programme for individual children.

Special needs staff liaise closely with outside agencies including Educational Psychology, Speech and Language Support etc to meet the needs of each individual child.

Children from Nursery to Primary 4 benefit from the involvement of the NHSCT's Regional Integrated Support for Education (RISE) in identifying and addressing their medical and physical needs.









Learning Support Centres & Autism Specific Centres

LSC and ASC provision in Holy Trinity Primary School

Holy Trinity Primary School currently has five specialist classes; three Learning Support Classes – LSC1, LSC2 and LSC3 and two Autism Specific Classes ASC1 and ASC2. These classes provide specialised teaching and learning in a small group setting. We currently have 43 children with placements in these classes. They have opportunities to join mainstream classes where appropriate. We also provide opportunities for mainstream children to integrate into the LSC/ASC classes too where they can benefit from the expertise and resources available there.

The LSC/ASC children experience a diverse range of activities and a breadth of opportunities. They follow a tailored programme which is highly structured and focuses heavily on multi-sensory teaching methods. Nurturing approaches are key in developing a holistic and child centred atmosphere which fosters the development of confidence, skills, language & communication, physical and learning.

Each day, the children have access to a sensory circuits programme, the sensory room, safe spaces within the classes and outdoor learning sessions. Many opportunities are planned to secure the links between the four classes such as, sharing a designated playground and dining area, carousel activities, PE sessions and celebrations/events.

A very successful buddy system is in operation where the older children in LSC3/ASC 2 help to support our youngest children at break/dinner times and during specific activities.

















Provision for Newcomer & EAL Pupils

(English as an Additional Language)

In Holy Trinity Primary School and Nursery, we approach the inclusion of our Newcomer children in a positive and pro-active way and ensure that they are fully participating members of the school community. Newcomer children and their families have enriched the life of everyone in our school and have allowed us to learn about other countries and cultures.

Currently, there are 216 EAL/Newcomer children (30%) in our school who represent many different countries. These diverse countries include Portugal, Poland, Slovakia, East Timor, Latvia, Lithuania, Romania, Czech Republic, Hungary, Turkey, Angola, Sao Tome a Principe, Guinea Bissau, India, Pakistan, Syria, Philippines, Indonesia, Russia, Bulgaria, Mozambique and Zimbabwe. More than 23 languages are spoken in our school.









Key events in our school calendar that promote inclusion and celebrate diversity are European Languages Day and World Day for Cultural Diversity. Important feasts and religious beliefs are recognised and supported eg Ramadan.

The EAL/Newcomer Support Team within our school, work closely with class teachers to provide appropriate and targeted language and pastoral support.

We are very fortunate to have Portuguese and East Timorese staff to support our children and families by interpreting or translating. We also have pupil peers who act as 'Buddies' offering pastoral or language support for new pupils to help them settle in to their new school.









Pupils Leading & Supporting





At Holy Trinity Primary School, our pupils are provided with many opportunities to have their voice heard and have some input in their learning. They are also given lots of opportunities to learn about leadership and to take the lead in supporting others in their learning. These include:

Pupil Council

Our Pupil Council is directly elected by pupils and plays an important role in the daily life of the school. Primary 1–7 pupils and representatives from our LSCs and ASCs make up our Pupil Council.



Members meet regularly to plan and carry out important assemblies. They also represent their classmates in bringing forward ideas and suggestions for inclusion in the School Development Plan. They also have official roles and responsibilities in terms of assisting at various school events.

Eco Council 2024-2025

Eco Council

Care for the environment is a key theme of our work in the area of PDMU. In each year group, the children are encouraged to participate in a range of curriculum projects and programmes which emphasise the need to care for and protect the local environment.







Our Eco Council is made up of representatives from Primary 1-7 who meet regularly to highlight eco-friendly and discuss within environmental issues school. They promote biodiversity and living sustainably through the Eco Schools programme. Through local and global campaigns, children are encouraged to make dynamic changes and create positive impacts for the future of our planet.

Digital Leaders

Our Digital Leaders are a team of KS2 pupil volunteers within our school. Their role is to support the use of technology, particularly iPads across the school. They do a variety of jobs including:

- Sharing their skills and expertise with other pupils, classes and teachers.
- Assisting teachers and other pupils in understanding coding applications.
- Setting up equipment in classrooms for teachers.
- Encouraging digital and online safety.





Reading Buddies

Our Reading Buddies are a group of selected pupil volunteers from Primary 6 & 7. Throughout the year, they support identified pupils from Primary 3 & 4 who need help, encouragement or confidence building with their reading.

During these daily sessions, they read together and work on key reading and word identification skills. They chat about the stories to strengthen comprehension too. This is directed by the class teacher and additional to the teaching of reading in the classroom.





Playground Friends

We have a group of pupil volunteers who also take on the role of Playground Friends every lunchtime. These pupils support their younger peers during play. They help them to organise games and to play well with their friends.

They model kindness and fairness and make sure that playtime is an enjoyable experience for all of the children in their care.







Extra Curricular Skills Development





In Holy Trinity Primary School, we believe in developing the whole child, and though we pride ourselves on the academic excellence of the children in our school, we seek to provide them with a wide variety of activities to develop their own interests and skills. There is a long tradition of musical excellence in Holy Trinity Primary School. Our music team have a wealth of experience and expertise and have nurtured many musical paths of our past and present pupils through the experiences, teaching, guidance and encouragement they received at our school.

<u>Choir</u>



Our school choir allows children to develop their choral skills.

Under the direction of Mrs Slater, our choir is much acclaimed and has given polished performances in various venues and at many prestigious events over the years including sacramental ceremonies, masses, events, choir services, Feiseanna and competitions. They have even made television and radio appearances too.

Music Tuition

At Holy Trinity Primary School, our children have the opportunity to learn to play a range of musical instruments through specialist tuition including:

- Woodwind - Tin whistle - Keyboard - Cello - Guitar - Electric Guitar

- Saxophone - Mandolin - Drums - Violin - Banjo - Vocals

They meet with their music specialist teachers, on a weekly basis and perform throughout the year at many school assemblies, events and celebrations.



Traditional

Under the direction of Mr Donald Canavan, we have a traditional music group which has performed at notable venues and events over the years including collegiately with other schools in our local Burnavon Theatre.

Classical

In our school, the EA Music Service deliver music tuition in a range of classical musical instruments. They offer a hire service of the instrument for a small annual fee so that pupils can access the specialist equipment without the additional expense.



Rock

Through the company iRock, music tuition is offered in the modern music art form of rock. Pupils can subscribe to termly tuition and learn technical skills in electric guitar, keyboard, drums and vocals.

A School Linked to its Community



Holy Trinity Primary School is a school at the heart of its Cookstown community. We take every opportunity to contribute to the life of our community and liaise closely with our families, the church, the parish, community groups, charities and other organisations.

As a Catholic school, we welcome children of all faiths and none. We regularly hold a variety of diverse school assemblies that are prepared and presented by all classes based on key PDMU themes and messages eg Anti-bullying Week and European Day of Languages etc. These are attended by parents or showcased through social media to the community.



Preparation for sacramental events such as Penance, First Holy Communion & Confirmation is an important part of the life of our school. We work closely with the local priests and parents to prepare the children for these important occasions in their lives.



We value our links and contacts with other schools in the local community. Our cross community links are especially strong and the Shared Education collaborative work and projects developed are mutually beneficial to all pupils in the locality and continue to promote good relations across the community.











- We ensure close links with our local post primary schools. Our Primary 6 and 7 children are invited to visit local post primary schools on Taster Days and Structured Activity Days in an effort to ease each child's transition to second level education. Members of staff from these schools also visit for information sessions during the school year.
- We have forged strong links with Fr Rocks GAC. They support us through our afterschool clubs and local blitzes and we are grateful to avail of their facilities regularly for games, sports days, events and tournaments.





Emergency Services including NIFRS (Northern Ireland Fire & Rescue Service), NIAS (Northern Ireland Ambulance Service) PSNI (Police Service of Northern Ireland) Community Team, and other assistive community agencies support our delivery of key aspects of the curriculum.





- * We liaise closely with numerous school health and nursing teams and other local Health Authority Personnel in catering for the needs of our pupils. With supporting a diverse range of multidisciplinary needs within our school, we are proactive in seeking help and advice from other statutory agencies and the school's educational psychologist to ensure immediate and the most effective support for our pupils.
- Concern for those in need in our community is one of our key values. We support many local charities each year that help the poor and disadvantaged both near and far. Most recently these have included St. Vincent de Paul, Mary's Meals, Trocaire, The Kevin Bell Repatriation Trust and Air Ambulance NI.
- At key times of year, our pupils also reach out to those less fortunate in the local community including Christmas carol singing in the local nursing homes, writing letters for the 'Kindness Post Box' for those isolated or alone and creating food hampers for those in need.













- * We are a life-long learning school and each year we are delighted to host many trainee students from St Mary's University College, Stranmillis University College, Queen's University Belfast, University of Ulster Coleraine, South West College and work experience students from local schools.



Admissions Criteria (Nursery)



A timetable of pre-school admissions procedures setting out the dates by which an application is to be submitted is available at www.eani.org.uk/admissions under 'Pre-School Admissions'. During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria punctual applications will be considered before late applications are considered.

The application procedure opens on 10 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 24 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) will be treated as a <u>punctual application</u>. An application received after 12noon (GMT) on 24 January 2025 will be treated as a <u>late application</u>.

As the <u>pre-school admissions procedure is in two stages</u> the timetable also specifies the relevant dates at Stage 2 which will determine if an application is to be considered as <u>punctual</u> or <u>late</u>.

Statutory Admissions Criteria

The Board of Governors will apply the following criteria to identify which children should be admitted.

- 1. Children from socially disadvantaged circumstances in their final pre-school year who were born:
 - on or between 2 July 2021 and 1 July 2022 (inclusive) and whose parents have not exercised their right to defer their child's entry to primary school; or,
 - on or between 1 April 2021 and 1 July 2021 (inclusive) or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and,
 - have not attended or are not currently attending a funded pre-school setting under the Pre-School Education Programme as a target aged child; and,
 - that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1 until September 2026.

Note: Children from 'socially disadvantaged circumstances' means a child whose parent has an entitlement to (i) Income Support, or (ii) Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, or (iii) Income related Employment and Support Allowance, or (iv) Universal Credit. When parents apply for places for their child on this basis they must provide Benefit Verification to confirm that they have an entitlement. The application procedure for Pre-School will outline how Benefit Verification can be submitted.

2. Children not from socially disadvantaged circumstances (as defined above) who are in their final pre-school year (as defined by criterion 1).

In the event of oversubscription in any of the above Statutory Criteria the following Sub-Criteria shall be applied in the order set down.

Sub-Criteria

- (a) Children who reside in the parish of Cookstown;
- (b) Children who, at the date of their application, have a child/children of the family presently enrolled in Holy Trinity Primary School Nursery Unit (including underage pupils) or Holy Trinity Primary School,
- N.B. Note: Children of the family includes brother/sister, half-brother/half-sister, adopted or foster brother/sister living at the same address.
- (c) First child in the family;
- (d) Children with special 'home' or other circumstances applied in order of:-
 - (i) Children with Special Educational Needs. (Special needs meaning those children in their immediate pre-school year who are being currently assessed by the EA as having special educational needs over and above those of other children);
 - (ii) Children on the 'at risk register;'
 - (iii) Children who have one or both parents deceased;
 - (iv) Children from a family with 3 or more pre-school children (includes twins/multiple births);
- (e) Children whose parent(s) is/are full-time/part-time members of the teaching, ancillary or auxiliary staff at Holy Trinity Primary School;
- (f) Other children.

In the application of all criteria, preference will be given to parents who indicate Holy Trinity Nursery Unit as their first preference.

In the event of oversubscription in the above sub-criteria taken in order, then selection for the remaining places will be on the basis of a randomly selected order of letters as set out below:

Alphabetical order will be used to select between surnames starting with the same letter. In the event of two or more children having the same surname, selection shall take place on the basis of proximity of the child's home to the school as measured by public road. When considering which children should be selected for admission, the Board of Governors will only take into account information which is detailed on or attached to the application form. Parents should therefore ensure that all information pertaining to their child and relevant to the school's admissions criteria is stated on the application form. Examples of such information include whether the child is the first child in the family. Parents must submit their child's birth certificate and any supporting documents such as their Benefit Verification Form, to the first preference provider at the time of applying. On the basis of incorrect or misleading information then the Board of Governors may withdraw the offer. All criteria will apply as at closing date on application form.

Non-statutory Admissions Criteria

3. Children who were born:

- -on or between 1 April 2021 1 July 2021 (inclusive), or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and have attended or are currently attending a funded pre-school setting under the Pre-School Education Programme as a target aged (not penultimate aged) child; and, that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1: or,
- on or between 2 July 2022 and 1 July 2023 (inclusive); or,
- on or between 1 April 2022 and 1 July 2022 (inclusive) or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1 until September 2027.

Tie Breaker - Non Statutory Criterion 3

Children within Criterion 3 will be selected in Chronological Order of Age — eldest child first. In the event of two or more children having the same DOB the above random selection of letters will be used.

Duty to Verify

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any applicant's application form.

If the requested evidence is not provided to the Board of Governors by the deadline given, this will result in the withdrawal of an offer of a place. Similarly, if information is supplied which appears to be false or misleading in any material way, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.

Waiting List Policy

Parents who are unsuccessful in obtaining a place will be asked if they wish their child to remain on a waiting list. Parents will be contacted if and when a place becomes available.

Admissions Criteria (Primary)



The Board of Governors draw up and apply the criteria for admissions.

Admissions Criteria

During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria punctual applications will be considered before late applications are considered.

The application procedure opens on 10 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 24 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) will be treated as a punctual application. An application received after 12noon (GMT) on 24 January 2025 and up to 4 pm on 29 January 2025 will be treated as a late application, this is also the last date and time for processing a change of preference in exceptional circumstances. After 4 pm on 29 January 2025 no applications will be processed until after the close of procedure on 9 April 2025.

Compulsory School Age

Any child who reaches their 4th Birthday on or before 1st July 2025 is of Compulsory School Age. Under the School Age (NI) Act which became law in Northern Ireland in April 2022, 'compulsory school age' also includes those children who deferred commencing Primary 1 in September 2024 as defined by the new School Age (NI) Act (both groups to be treated equally).

Priority will be given to children resident in Northern Ireland at the time of their proposed admission to the school before those who are not so resident.

Statutory Admissions Criteria

The Board of Governors will apply the following criteria to identify which children should be admitted either at initial admission to education or on transfer from another school.

- 1. Children who live within the Parish boundaries of Cookstown.
- 2. Children who, at the date of their application, have a child of the family (including an adopted or fostered child) presently enrolled in Holy Trinity Primary School Nursery Unit (including underage pupils) or Holy Trinity Primary School.
- 3. First child in the family.
- 4. Children in special circumstances (medical social, security factors), where this is supported by evidence from parents/guardians and statutory agencies.

- 5. Children for whom the school is the Catholic Maintained primary school nearest to their home measured by shortest driving distance (using Google maps).
- 6. Children whose parent/guardian is presently a member of the school teaching/ancillary/auxiliary staff.
- 7. The remaining places will be allocated on the basis of the proximity of the child's home to school as measured by shortest driving distance (using Google maps).

Criterion 7 will also be used to discriminate within any oversubscribed criterion except for criterion 1.

If oversubscribed within criterion 1 the remaining criteria will be applied to the children who meet criterion 1 in the indicated order to identify which children are to be selected for admission. Should oversubscription occur when a criterion is applied then criterion 7 will be applied as the deciding factor.

Birth certificates are required for all applicants and should be provided directly to the first preference school.

Duty to Verify

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any application.

If the requested evidence is not provided to the Board of Governors by the deadline given, this will result in the withdrawal of an offer of a place. Similarly, if information is supplied which appears to be false or misleading in any material way, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.

Waiting List Policy

In the event of oversubscription, a waiting list for places will be established using **the first** come first served basis.

Admission to Primary 2 - Primary 7

By arrangement.

Arrangements for Admission

During the summer term each year, children to be admitted to P1 in September will be invited to come to the school with their parents to meet the teacher and to be provided with additional information.
